Natalie Brabec, Nutrition and Wellness, Level 3


Natalie's project required her to track her family's food intake and physical activity for a week. Using her data, she created nutrition and wellness goals for her family along with the plan to implement them.

District Results: Silver, State Qualifier


Bailey Lemburg and Mitchel Beeson, Sports Nutrition, Level 3

Technology in the Classroom: Great Job Teachers!!

Mrs. Wietfeld's science witnessed the Mars Rover landing via Zoom.

K-6th grade students are creating Digital Citizenship PSA's and posters for the Nebraska Digital Citizenship Symposium. The theme this year is Belong, Be Safe, Be Kind, Be a digi-smart citizen. We have had some amazing discussions about how to be an upstander online and how to be safe.

<u>4th-6th grade students</u> watched Karen Hasse, a school attorney, talk about Consequences of online misbehavior. Students then took a Gimkit quiz and received a certificate.

<u>Miss Remmereid's Tech Apps classes created material for the Vision Board this</u> year and learned how to film and edit video. They also created Sponsorship videos with voice overs. This is an amazing real world experience. Her classes helped work the vision board13 varsity games in December through February.

By the end of the basketball season we added in-game stats for conference games with the help of Shelby P., Scott Petersen, and Neveah & Ava.

Younger siblings of basketball players were involved by filming cheer starters for the crowd during timeouts.

Thank you upperclassmen basketball players for reading our sportsmanship message and Soleece Hill for recording her National Anthem for a back up.

Mrs. Held's JH P.E. class partnered up with Mrs. Hollatz for STEM with activity. Students first created their own Fidget Spinner after research to show other students how to contain their boxed up energy. The next week students created a Makey Makey exercise circuit for 2nd graders to run through using exercise. They had Dance Revolution, the Dinosaur Internet Jump Game, Hot Potato, Flappy Bird Jump, Piano Steps, etc. The final project was Dash Robots. Students blockly coded the robots through a maze they designed, if the robot hit the yarn they were supposed to do some kind of exercise.

<u>World Read Aloud Day</u> was on February 4th, Mrs. Fischer and Mrs. Held's classes read aloud picture books so the elementary students could see what great readers look like. It was such a fun collaboration and a great way to show leadership.

Counselor Notes - Karen Hillen

As I am writing this month's counselor notes, it is -15 degrees and the students have had a 2 day break from classes. For students, snow days are almost always a welcome relief from the day to day work of school and that may be an OK thing. Dr. Matthew Zakretski, a father and clinical psychologist who works with neuro-diverse kids states, "kids need time away from demanding tasks like school and chores, time to just be kids." He goes on to say, "Our increasingly rigid adherence to academic 'progress' for kids at whatever cost is hurting our kids socially, emotionally, and developmentally. They need to have things like snow days as part of the social contract of attending school; you do what you're asked and you can have days of release and relief when the weather allows. It is a valued and necessary treat."

With all of this said, I am hopeful that we have seen the last of our snow days and that we can get back into the routine of school. If March comes in "like a lion" let's be hopeful that it will treat us "like a lamb" for the majority of the month. We start off the month with Parent-Teacher conferences on March 2. We always encourage parents to take a few minutes to visit with their child's teachers. It is good to have a two way conversation to recognize the achievements of your child and to discuss and discover areas for improvement.

A reminder that all parents are eligible to have access to their child's grades and assignments through the **Infinite Campus** parent portal. If you are not familiar with this system or have forgotten your login information, please visit with me at conferences or contact me via phone or email and I can help get you started. Through this system, you can also check lunch balances and attendance as well as check and update your contact information (phone numbers and email addresses), and your preferences for contact methods for school closures and other important information.

One of the topics that is covered in our elementary guidance lessons is using positive self talk as a way to deal with strong emotions. As parents, you may hear your children make comments such as "I'm bad at this" or "I will never learn this, I'm so dumb." Often times, parents may respond with statements such as "Don't say that" or "You're not dumb." Simply making these statements only dismisses the child's feelings and doesn't really help them to deal with the feeling. Below are some ideas that were shared from Big Life Journal.com, a website that offers ideas and activities to help parents deal with the day to day issues of parenting.

Instead of:	Try:
Don't say that!	Tell me what makes you feel that way.
I'm bad at this too. It's just not our thing	Just because it's hard doesn't mean you can't be good at it. Let's look at it together.
I don't want to ever hear this again.	Is that really what you're thinking or are you just tired right now?
Don't worry. You'll learn this in no time!	Sometimes we need to give our brains time to learn.

Wrapping up your senior year

- **-Watch your student portal and email closely.** Once you're accepted for admission, the colleges you listed on your FAFSA will notify you of the financial aid they're offering.
- -Keep your grades up. If you get poor grades this semester, your college could revoke your admission.
- **-Apply for scholarships**. See <u>ScholarshipQuest</u> at **EducationQuest.org** for Nebraska-based scholarships. You'll also find links to national scholarship sites.
- **-Be aware of deadlines** to accept financial aid and college admission offers, submit your housing deposit, and register for new-student orientation.

From the Principal's Desk:

We are plowing forward through the end of February into March. We have had quite a few school days lost due to snow and bitter cold. This always makes getting into a school routine more difficult. The teachers and students have adapted. If nothing else, the Covid pandemic has reminded us of the need for flexibility.

Winter sports seasons are finishing with some notable accomplishments. As of the writing of this article, the girls basketball team has a record of 20-1. The boys are 11-9 and are looking at having their first winning record since the 2014 -2015 season. Our wrestling team showed significant growth over the season with five individuals advancing from subdistricts to the district competition. Dylan Higby qualified for the state tournament and won one match before dropping a close match in the consolation round to finish in the top twelve. We hosted varsity basketball games in Leigh for the first time in many years. This included three nights of the East Husker Conference tournament where eight different teams played in our new facility.

Students in grades 7-11 are completing MAP (Measures of Academic Progress) testing before the end of February. These tests are taken twice a year and help us note individual growth as well as achievement by an entire grade level. Our CIP (Continuous Improvement Process) team is using this data to guide academic decisions and possible interventions. From data, one goal they have established is to help our students become more proficient at reading informational text. This could involve, but is not limited to: textbooks, scientific articles, opinion pieces, historical essays. With advances in technology, we are definitely in the information age. It is important for our student to be able to dissect this information.
